

Esophageal Atresia/ Tracheoesophageal Fistula

Esophageal atresia/tracheoesophageal fistula (EA/TEF) (e-soph-a-ge-al a-tre-si-a/tra-che-o-e-soph-a-ge-al fis-tu-la) is a birth anomaly of the swallowing tube (esophagus) that connects the mouth to the stomach. In a baby with EA, the esophagus has two separate sections—the upper and lower esophagus—that do not connect. A baby with this birth defect is unable to pass food from the mouth to the stomach, and sometimes has difficulty breathing. EA often occurs with TEF, a birth anomaly in which part of the esophagus is connected to the windpipe (trachea). The trachea is the tube that connects the mouth and nose to the lungs.
