

# Cloacal Extrophy

A child with cloacal exstrophy is born with part of the large intestine outside of the body and with the two halves of the bladder out on either side of it. In males, the penis is either flat and short or sometimes split. In females, the clitoris is separated into a right half and left half. The intestine may be short and the anus, where normally poop passes out of the body, may not have an opening. With this condition there are often other birth defects, like spina bifida.
