The purpose of RENEW Oregon is to expand academic-clinical partnerships that prepare and graduate academically and clinically prepared family nurse practitioners (FNP) and psychiatric mental health nurse practitioners (PMHNP) to improve access and meet the primary health care needs of rural and urban underserved populations in Oregon. \$383,000 was provided in scholarships to 29 FNP & PMHNP students in Year 4 of the Grant.
